Classroom Updates

KINDERGARTEN

During the month of November, Kindergarten has been learning about what it means to be thankful. We have had a wonderful time celebrating each other and being grateful for what we have. We are looking forward to December and all the learning and fun to be had!

ELA: We will move into Unit 5 upon our return from our Thanksgiving break. Our theme for the next three weeks will focus on technology at school and at home. For Phonics, we will continue to focus on one sound/ week but hone in on pinpointing specific sounds within a CVC word (beginning, middle, end). We will also touch on phoneme isolation, phoneme addition, and phoneme substitution, which will help with rhyming. With the week long break coming up, we strongly encourage for you all to work with your child on their sight words. We are quickly learning that many sentences we read in class contain many sight words!

Writing/Grammar: We have been focusing on writing a complete sentence where we have been emphasizing a capital letter in the beginning, spaces between words, punctuation, and a complete thought. In grammar, we've been working on prepositions.

Social Studies: In Social Studies, we touched a little on what an election is and how voting comes
 into play. In each classroom, we held a mock election where students made their very own voter
 registration card. We have also been learning about the Pilgrims and Native Americans. We encourage you to ask your student about what they have learned! We will continue to work on rules and procedures, and in December, we will study how different countries celebrate Christmas- stay tuned for information regarding our festivities!

Math: In math we recently wrapped up Chapter 5 where students have been slowly introduced to the meaning of addition in terms of having groups and then putting those groups together to find the total. With the new vocabulary and number bonds, it's been a lot but your students all show such great effort! Chapter 6 will begin after our Thanksgiving break where we will introduce the addition sign and continue learning the concept of addition- but using different strategies.

Science: We recently wrapped up our unit on Day and Night. When we return from Thanksgiving break, we will be moving into the topic of Matter. Students will learn how to sort objects by properties such as: size, shape, color, temperature, weight, and texture. Students will also be learning how to recognize that the shape of materials can be changed.

1ST GRADE

Phonics: long a, long o, soft c and g. We will also be working on blending and substitution READING: Use illustrations and Details to Describe Key Ideas, Draw Inferences, Main Topic and Key Details

Grammar: In this unit, we will be reviewing how to use past-tense irregular verbs in sentences. Irregular past-tense verbs do not end in -ed and some irregular verbs stay the same when describing an event that has already happened. We will also be using interjections to add emotions to our sentences. Interjections are words or short phrases that students will use at the beginning of a sentence.

Writing: In this unit, we will be revisiting how to write an Expository piece on the topic of how technology has helped us. Students will learn that technology is more than just phones and tablets and they will extend their thoughts and writing practices by finding facts and details, explaining how the evidence they found supports their topic, and editing their writing for a final piece.

Math: This month we will be focusing on subtraction within 20 as we begin Chapter 5. The first graders will continue to use the subtraction strategies from Chapters 2 & 3. The goal is for the students to find a strategy that they can use reliably. They will be able to use number lines, part + part '= whole, make a ten, ten frames, & subtracting 9. Students will also identify whether an equation is true or false. They will find the value of each side of the equation & understand if the values are equal or not.

Science: We are continuing to learn about matter and how properties help identify and classify objects.

Social Studies: We are continuing to learn about American History and the order of important events that shapes our country

2ND GRADE

ELA: In ELA we will be finishing up our unit on character's perspectives. We will then begin our unit on solving problems through technology. We will focus on the essential question "Where do ideas for inventions come from?".

Math: In math we will wrap up our unit on subtracting numbers within 100 and will begin our unit adding numbers to 1,000.

Writing: In writing, students will begin to write a narrative about a new invention they created that helps solve a problem. Students will be writing complete sentences, using transitions, and demonstrating legible print while writing their narratives.

Social Studies and Science: As we finish out the quarter, we will be focusing on changing matter in science, and in social studies, we will continue our Native American studies unit by comparing cultures and the influence of immigration on Native American culture.

3RD GRADE

In **ELA**, we will explore various text features. These include headings, captions, and diagrams. Each feature helps us understand the text better. We will have a fun Gingerbread person review with many fun activities and a Holiday celebration.

In **Social Studies**, we will be learning about Economics. We will explore the basics of supply and demand. Each student will design and create their own items. This hands-on activity will allow us to apply what we learn about production and marketing while we will set up our own mini stores. This will give us real experience in buying, selling, and managing finances.

In **Math**, we will be learning about number patterns and finding areas. Both topics will be a fun way to enhance problem-solving abilities and mathematical reasoning.

In **Science**, we will be learning about types of energy. Each type of energy plays a crucial role in the natural world and in various processes.

4TH GRADE

4th grade is so excited for all the upcoming performances our students are going to be involved in this month. We want to give a special thanks to the families who donated to our recess cart last month. We've sent home information about our field trip to St. Augustine and permission slips are due on December 20th.

Math: We've finished our multiplication and division units, but we will continue to work on these skills as they're vital to our 4th graders' success moving forward, as well as it will be in fifth grade. We're going to continue using our multiplication and division skills to create equivalent fractions. We're also going to be using models to compare fractions.

ELA: In ELA, we are completing our unit of learning about character perspectives and identifying the point of view. We will wrap this up with our upcoming summative assessment. Students will begin unit 5, which explores different types of technology and robotics. It will incorporate some of our prior knowledge of context clues and text structures. Students will use evidence from the stories read to practice citing evidence.

We will also begin our argumentative essays on real vs. artificial Christmas trees. Students will be reading texts defending each type of tree, learning how to cite evidence, and develop their stance on their perspective of which tree is better.

Science: In Science, we're finishing up our Matter Unit focusing on the differences between physical and chemical changes and we'll be moving on to our Energy unit next.

Social Studies: In Social Studies, we are finishing up learning about the different branches of Florida government, along with its roles and functions. Next, we will be taking a magical journey into learning about holidays around the world. Students will be exploring holiday traditions of various countries as we complete a lapbook keepsake of our learning.

5TH GRADE

Dear 5th-Grade Families,

We're excited to share the topics and activities your child is exploring this month! Here's what's happening in our classrooms:

Math: Dividing with Decimals

This week, students are diving deeper into the process of dividing with decimals. They are learning to:

- Adjust decimal points in both the dividend and divisor to simplify division.
- Use estimation to check the reasonableness of their answers.
- Apply these skills to real-world problems, such as calculating costs per unit or determining average values.

We are focusing on strengthening their problem-solving and critical thinking skills by working on multi-step problems.

Science: Matter

Our science lessons are centered around the properties and states of matter (solid, liquid, gas) and how matter changes state through physical and chemical processes. Key concepts include:

- Identifying physical properties (mass, volume, density, and color).
- Observing how heating or cooling affects states of matter (e.g., melting ice, boiling water).
- Conducting experiments to distinguish between physical changes (e.g., tearing paper) and chemical changes (e.g., baking soda and vinegar reaction).

Students are also learning to classify matter based on its composition (elements, compounds, and mixtures). Encourage them to discuss what they've observed in their experiments and identify examples of matter changes around the house!

ELA: Author's Point of View

This week in English Language Arts, students are analyzing author's point of view by:

- Identifying whether an author is writing from a first-person, second-person, or thirdperson perspective.
- Exploring how an author's personal opinions, experiences, and cultural background can shape their narrative or argument.
- Comparing multiple texts on the same topic to see how different authors approach similar ideas.

Students are practicing this skill through journal entries, reading excerpts from fiction and nonfiction texts, and discussing the nuances of perspective in class. Encourage your child to share what they're reading and their thoughts on how the author's perspective influences the message of the story or article.

Social Studies: European Explorers and the Thirteen Colonies

In social studies, we are exploring how European exploration led to the establishment of the Thirteen Colonies. Key lessons this week include:

- Understanding the motivations behind exploration, such as the search for new trade routes, wealth, and spreading religion.
- Learning about influential explorers like Christopher Columbus, Henry Hudson, and Hernán Cortés, and their impact on indigenous peoples.
- Tracing the development of the Thirteen Colonies and how factors like geography and natural resources influenced their economies and cultures.
- Discussing the challenges colonists faced, including conflicts with Native Americans, harsh climates, and building settlements from scratch.

Students are working on mapping activities, creating timelines, and reading primary source documents to better understand this transformative period in history.

6TH GRADE

Greetings... Welcome to Raulerson's Radicals

We are entering a new phase in our semester, and the scholars are progressing extremely well towards leaving their mark.

The Math department is exploring the world of 'Precents and Fractions, (changing percents into fraction and fractions into percents). We are learning the relationship of 'Parts to the Whole', and how to estimate values.

Scitney Science

Hello,

Students have started their unit on the Earth System. Students should be able to identify objects in each sphere and discuss interactions between the spheres. Earth Spheres include: Hydrosphere, Biosphere, Geosphere, Atmosphere and Cryosphere. Just before break, students started learning about the layers of the Atmosphere and how they work to protect life on Earth and insulate the planet to maintain stable temperatures. Students will test on this unit the week we leave for Winter break.

6th Grade U.S. History:

Students have been learning about the American Revolution. Students have completed skits in class on Taxation without Representation! We have enjoyed some tea when we studied the Boston Tea Party. We are finishing up our summative Children's Book Projects. After Thanksgiving we will discover the content of the Declaration of Independence!

ELA:

Dear Readers,

Happy December! We are close to finishing up our second quarter and our second book project! Book projects are due on December 13th. I am excited to announce that I have selected the book study we will be doing in class! Upon our return to school, we will be diving into A Wrinkle in Time. While reading this book, students will study plot elements, character development, and imagery. I anticipate the students will enjoy this book and find the story as interesting as I do! This book study will take place in class and should not require additional reading outside class time.

7TH GRADE

As we approach the winter break, we wanted to update you on some exciting developments in 7th-grade.

In **English Language Arts**, we are reading the classic tale, "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. This timeless story is not only a literary masterpiece but also a wonderful opportunity for students to explore themes of generosity and compassion. In regular math, students are working probability. For those in the accelerated math track, the focus will be on angles and triangles. Encourage your students to engage actively in class discussions and seek help if needed.

In **Science**, students have the creative freedom to craft either a skit or a song showing their understanding of the Rock Cycle. Please be aware that the deadline for this project is December 18th! The unit test will be given on December 19th, right before winter break. Please check gradebook for assignments we are currently working on. You can also access all my content on my website.

In **Civics** we will be working on and completing Unit 4: Federalism. On December 16th and 17th there will be a VBA on Units 1-4 to see where students currently stand on Standard Mastery. These will not be grades in the gradebook.

8TH GRADE

Mrs. Fiorica (Pre-Algebra):

We've just wrapped up Chapter 8, where students explored the world of exponents and scientific notation. It's been an exciting and challenging unit, and students have worked hard to master these important concepts. Next up, we're diving into the fascinating world of triangles! Please be sure to check the gradebook for all relevant resources, including remediation materials to support your student's learning. As we move into the holiday season, we're looking forward to some fun activities, including our annual sock exchange. More details will be coming soon! Mrs. Rosso (Science):

We have been working hard learning about properties of matter and density. Our DIA Summative test will be on December 10th. Students should be looking over their notes and unit benchmarks to stay up to date and do their best. Study guides will go home on December 3rd and are worth extra credit on their DIA. Mrs. Troy (ELA):

This December, our English classes are setting off on exciting literary adventures! English Honors students will continue exploring the epic journey theme with Watership Down by Richard Adams. Meanwhile, our general ELA classes will dive into the chilling tales of Edgar Allan Poe's The Tell-Tale Heart and W.W. Jacobs' The Monkey's Paw, followed by a novel study of Neil Gaiman's Coraline. It's going to be a thrilling month full of suspense and surprises—get ready for the ride!

Mr. Wilson (World History):

This month in World History, we are studying ancient Egypt. We just completed and presented our skits on the mummification process. We will continue by looking at the Middle and New Kingdoms of Egypt when we get back from Thanksgiving break.

Mrs. Zafra:

Algebra will be breaking away from linear equations and starting exponential functions this month. These very different from the equations we have worked on so far this year. TEACHER CHARACTERS: If your student is playing one of the three teacher characters, they can wear a costume that epitomizes those teachers, as long as they are still able to move comfortably.

- Haskell: Music teacher. Very traditional teacher/grownup office look.

- Langton: Art teacher. Paint spattered clothes, but otherwise traditional teacher/grownup office look.

UNDERSTUDIES: If your student is playing an understudy, they should dress in their rocker look. If they are an understudy for a teacher character and we can not give them advance warning so they can change their costumes, Mrs. Terhune will assist with a few accessories to make them look closer to the character.

SKIRTS – Must have shorts/leggings underneath

SHOES - Students will be barefoot, unless they have nude or black jazz shoes. Named characters included. Please consider this when planning costuming.

The most important part of costuming is to make sure all friends are still able to move comfortably for their class's dance and they're not blocking other friends while on the risers.


Choir: We have begun working on our preparation for our upcoming Concert Music Performance Assessments in March. Stay tuned for specific dates and times.
